

The 'eternal child' in man is an indescribable experience, an incongruity, a handicap, and a divine prerogative; an imponderable that determines the ultimate worth or worthlessness of a personality (CW9i, par. 300). How can we relate to this ineluctable, yet comprehensive, archetype as Jung has portrayed it? The Child comes to us in dreams, art, and everyday life. On a personal level, we can approach it through the images and emotional legacies of childhood. This inner child can fill our days with blame of those who have caused us suffering, or it can initiate a healing process. It can lead us to forgotten gifts waiting to be developed, or point to troublesome limitations in need of integration. Ultimately, the archetypal Child heralds the Self. It charges the individual to bring her or his truest values into life with courage, humility, and imagination. The lecture will be illustrated by a series of dreams.

In the 1930's Jung's ideas reached an ever-wider audience through public lectures, seminars, and interviews with leading journalists of the day. In October 1937 he presented the Terry Lectures at Yale University. Rather coyly he suggested that a small room be reserved, so that the room would not seem too empty. His hosts knew how popular his three lectures would be, however, and in fact over 2,500 people attended each one. In 1938 Yale University Press published the lectures as Psychology and Religion, and they are still available in paperback from Yale University Press, in the 1938 format. They have also been reprinted in Volume 11 of the *Collected Works*.

Any of Jung's lectures or seminar proceedings that have been published are exceptionally readable, and so it is with Psychology and Religion. He very clearly presents many of his key ideas on religion, religious experience, numinosity, symbols, and dreams.
